UPD Details

7p22.3q36.3 maternal uniparental disomy

Maternal UPD7 is associated with Russell-Silver Syndrome (RSS) (OMIM_618905), related to abnormal expression of imprinted regions at 7p11.2p12 and 7q32.3 (Monk, 2000; Kim, 2005; Vincent, 2022). RSS is characterized by growth failure, body asymmetry, feeding difficulties, developmental delay, triangular face with small jaw, frontal bossing, and clinodactyly (Siklar and Berberoglu, 2014; Saal, 2025).

Analyses Performed

- Genome sequencing, bioinformatics, filtering and manual review based on dominant and recessive inheritance models was performed. Medical review of characterized genetic etiologies revealed an alteration with clinical relevance.
- Medical review of uncharacterized genes* and gene-disease relationships for potential candidate gene findings was not performed because a finding in a characterized gene/region was identified.
- Additional analyses were performed as described in the methodology. Clinically significant variants with relevance to the patient phenotype, if identified by these analyses, are included on this report.

*Uncharacterized genes are not currently established to underlie Mendelian genetic conditions. An uncharacterized gene will be classified as a “candidate” when sufficient evidence, based on Ambry’s comprehensive, rule-based scoring criteria, is available (Farwell Hagman, 2017).

Assay Information

General Information	Ambry's GenomeNext™ is a comprehensive genome sequencing assay designed to increase diagnostic yield for suspected genetic disorders that have remained unsolved using traditional approaches. The genome includes both protein-coding and non-coding regions, and genome sequencing has been successfully applied to identify inherited and de novo variants across autosomal dominant, autosomal recessive, and X-linked disorders. This assay includes analysis of single nucleotide variants (SNVs); small insertions and deletions (indels); copy number variants (CNVs); mitochondrial genome SNVs and indels; repeat expansions in the <i>DMPK</i> , <i>FMR1</i> , and <i>PHOX2B</i> genes; <i>SMN1</i> deletions; uniparental disomy (UPD); and aneuploidy. In addition to the primary analysis focused on the patient's reported clinical presentation, genome testing may also detect secondary findings (pathogenic/likely pathogenic variants in select genes) unrelated to the indication for testing.
Methodology	Genomic DNA is isolated from the patient's specimen using standardized technology. PCR-free libraries are prepared and sequenced on Illumina platforms using paired-end sequencing chemistry with an average mean sequencing coverage of at least 30x. Initial data processing (base calling, alignment, and variant calling) is performed using validated bioinformatics tools and aligned to the GRCh38/hg38 human reference genome assembly. Variants are annotated and prioritized using the clinical and family information provided by the ordering provider, population databases, published literature, sequence level quality metrics, and established variant classification guidelines. Copy number changes are assessed using coverage and/or breakpoint evidence from NGS data. Reportable findings not satisfying established quality metrics are verified with an appropriate orthogonal method as needed. Screening for repeat expansions in <i>DMPK</i>, <i>FMR1</i>, and <i>PHOX2B</i> is performed via sequencing. For reported <i>DMPK</i> and <i>FMR1</i> expansions, repeat size is determined by repeat-primed PCR. <i>SMN1</i> deletions are assessed by sequencing and are confirmed by multiplex ligation-dependent probe amplification (MLPA) prior to reporting. Co-segregation studies may be performed when family members are available. If ordered, ribonucleic acid (RNA) is isolated from the patient's whole blood. RNA is converted to complementary DNA (cDNA) by reverse transcriptase polymerase chain reaction (RT-PCR). RNA analysis is performed for reportable germline DNA variants expected to affect splicing, provided such studies are likely to meaningfully inform variant classification.

Result Reports	A primary clinical report is generated only for the proband; family member information will be reported if applicable. Only variants relevant to the proband's current phenotype are included in the primary report. Relevant pathogenic and likely pathogenic variants are routinely reported; selected variants of uncertain significance may also be reported. Variants that increase a statistical risk for disease are not routinely reported. Incidental findings, as well as benign or likely benign variants, are not reported. Pathogenic and likely pathogenic secondary findings within the ACMG-recommended gene list are reported separately unless opted out.
Test Limitations and Disclaimers	This test was developed and its performance characteristics determined by Ambry Genetics. It has not been cleared or approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). This laboratory is certified under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments (CLIA) to perform high-complexity clinical laboratory testing. Results should be interpreted in the context of the patient's clinical and family history and do not constitute medical advice; a negative result does not rule out a genetic condition. Detectable variant types include nucleotide substitutions and small insertions/deletions <50 bp, copy number variants and select structural variants, and mitochondrial variants with ≥5% heteroplasmy. Sensitivity may be reduced for copy number variants between 1kb and 10kb. Uniparental disomy of clinically relevant regions will only be reported when testing is run as a trio analysis. Trinucleotide repeat screening by this assay is limited to the <i>DMPK</i>, <i>FMR1</i>, and <i>PHOX2B</i> genes. Repeat sizes are reported with an accuracy of +/- 2 repeats for alleles with 1-54 repeats and an accuracy of +/- 5 repeats for alleles with 55-200 repeats. Exact repeat size cannot be determined for alleles with >200 repeats. The overall coverage of each genomic region varies and each individual may have slightly different coverage yield; regions with shared homology/repetitive sequence and other sequence-context limitations may reduce sensitivity and specificity (including for CNVs/structural variation). This test is not intended to analyze certain variant types, including but not limited to: gross/balanced rearrangements, portions of genes with highly homologous pseudogenes, mitochondrial genome deletions/duplications, epigenetic effects, oligogenic inheritance, X-linked recessive variants in females who manifest disease due to skewed X-inactivation, or variants involved in tri-allelic inheritance. Some variants may not be detected due to technical limitations such as but not limited to low coverage, repetitive/highly homologous regions, certain structural rearrangements, or low-level mosaicism. Chromosomes and Genes	Chromosomes are packages of DNA. They are made up of genes that provide instructions for how our bodies develop. Almost everyone has two copies of each chromosome, one from each parent. Variants in our genes or chromosomes can cause genetic conditions. These genetic variants may be passed down in families or occur for the first time in the person who has a genetic condition. Even if there is no history of the specific condition in your family, it can still be caused by a variant in a person’s genes or chromosomes.
Exome and Genome Sequencing	Exome and genome sequencing tests are designed to look for genetic variants in genes that may be the cause of an existing medical condition. Exome sequencing is a test that analyzes all genes known to cause medical conditions. Genome sequencing is another test that analyzes all genes known to cause medical conditions; it can also detect rare types of genetic variants that can not be detected by exome sequencing.
Result	This testing found one or more pathogenic or likely pathogenic variants in one or more genes that are known to be associated with your existing medical condition.
Cause	The test result confirms a genetic cause of your medical condition. Sometimes, genetic conditions can put a person at increased risk of other medical problems later in life. Talk with your healthcare provider to learn more about whether additional medical screening may be considered.
